

Methodology



## Methodology

- This study was conducted on the Galaxy Online Omnibus between Tuesday 9-11 July 2013.
- The sample was 1,000 Australians aged 18 years and over, who are eligible to vote, distributed throughout Australia, as follows:

NSW/ACT	334
Victoria/Tasmania	285
Queensland	190
South Australia	84
Western Australia	107

- Age, gender and region quotas were applied to the sample.
- Interviews were conducted using an online permission-based panel with invitations sent out in proportion to age and gender within state.
- Following the completion of interviewing, the data was weighted by age, gender and region to reflect the latest ABS population estimates using the 2011 Census.

# Main Findings



## Main Findings

"Kevin Rudd has publicly announced that he believes that same sex couples should be allowed to marry. Does this make you more likely or less likely to vote Labor?" (QB1)

- With Kevin Rudd announcing that he believes same-sex couples should be allowed to marry, 30% of eligible Australian voters say that this makes them more likely to vote Labor and 19% say that they are less likely to vote Labor. Almost half (47%) say that it won't change their vote.
- There is a strong trend towards younger voters being more likely to vote Labor as a result of Kevin Rudd's statement
  - 54% Among 18-24 year olds
  - 42% Among 25-34 year olds
  - 33% Among 35-49 year olds
  - 18% Among 50 years and older
- Among Australians who support The Coalition 11% say that they are now more likely to vote Labor,
- Among Labor supporters 6% are now less likely to vote Labor.
- Also, among Greens supporters 54% are now more likely to vote Labor and 7% are less likely to vote labor. Overall this suggests a net swing towards Labor.



## Main Findings ...continued

Tony Abbott is opposed to same sex couples marrying and does not allow Liberal members of parliament to vote according to their own conscience. Do you feel that Tony Abbott is out of step with community views on this issue (QB2)

- Overall, 58% of voters feel that Tony Abbott is out of step with community views on the issue of same-sex couples marrying.
- Younger Australians are more likely to say that Tony Abbott is out of step (63% of 18-24 year olds say this) compared to older Australians (52% of ages 50 years and older say this)
- Even among Coalition supporters 37% say that Tony Abbott is out of step with community views on this issue.
- Among Labor party supporters 75% believe that he is out of step, and among Greens 82% believe that Tony Abbott is out of step on this issue.



## Main Findings ...continued

Do you think that the government should change the law now to allow same-sex couples to marry, rather than wait for a national referendum (QB3)

- Almost half (47%) of Australian voters want the law changed now to allow same-sex couples to marry
- More than half (52%) of Generation Y (18-34 years) say that they want the law changed now.
- A further 30% say wait for a referendum. Therefore 77% of all voters want at least a referendum on the issue, only 23% say neither.
- One in four (28%) of Coalition supporters say that government should change the law now, and a further 37% say wait for a referendum. One in three (34%) of Coalition supporters want neither.
- Among Labor supporters only one in ten (13%) want no action and similarly, among Greens supporters on one in ten (11%) want no action.
